Temperature

God has given us the ability to sense the temperature of objects and the atmosphere around us. The ability to sense heat and cold is a gift that guards us against destroying our bodies. When we touch a hot stove or pan, we pull our hand back without even thinking about it. Doctors have learned how to use heat and cold to help cure or relieve pain in our bodies.

But what exactly is temperature? The dictionary describes it as the degree or intensity of heat present in a substance or object, especially as expressed according to a comparative scale and shown on a thermometer or perceived by touch.

When we think about the contrast in the seasons—cold and windy in the winter and hot and humid in the summer—we can see God's wisdom in designing spring and fall to help us gradually adjust to these extreme temperatures. If we had to go from ten degrees one day to ninety degrees the next, our bodies would never be able to handle the change.

Our relationships also can be understood in terms of temperature. When someone avoids our presence or will not speak with us, we consider the relationship to be cold. When we have a vibrant relationship in which the heart's deepest feelings can be shared anytime without fear, we consider it to be a warm relationship.

During COVID times in Guatemala, we are reminded of the importance of a normal body temperature. When we enter a store, someone is there to check our temperature to ensure that we do not have a fever. I have seen some people denied entrance to a store because their temperature was above the limit allowed.

How does God look at our spiritual temperature? Our spiritual temperature is even more important than our physical temperature. In Revelation 3:15, 16, we read that the Laodiceans were lukewarm—neither hot nor cold. God said that He would spew them out of His mouth. Our ability to sense the temperature of foods helps us under-

stand how this spiritual condition is repulsive to Him. When we expect a certain food to be hot but find it only lukewarm, it gives us a bad taste.

Why were these people lukewarm? They were spiritually sick. They trusted in their own righteousness and didn't even know they were sick. God's thermometer always gives the correct reading. God, the Great Physician, also has the remedy for our spiritual diseases.

In Matthew 24:11, 12 we find another reason for spiritual coldness. The false prophets come with a feel-good doctrine that deceives their listeners about their spiritual state. Through this means, iniquity abounds and many more people are deceived.

2 Timothy 4:3, 4 also speaks of false prophets. They teach only what the people want to hear, using their own agenda to pull their listeners away from the truth and turn them to fables.

1 Timothy 4 has much to say about our spiritual temperature. This passage warns that some will be spiritually hot, but when the seducing spirits come, they will be led astray. These spirits don't do their work in one day. There is a gradual falling away until the conscience is seared and there is no more feeling left.

How can we avoid this fate? 1 Timothy 4:13 says that we need to give attendance to reading, to exhortation, and to doctrine. Our reading should always be checked with the Bible. In verse 15 we are commanded to meditate on God's Word and to give ourselves wholly to the teachings that we find there. John 17:17b says, "Thy word is truth." As we become familiar with the truth, it will be easier to detect false doctrines. A bank teller learns to detect fake bills by handling the real thing; when a fake bill comes, he can detect it right away.

1 Timothy 4:16—Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear
